## **Snapshot: April SFMC Meeting**

The SFMC last met in Hobart on 3 April. Some of the items tabled/actioned included:

- **2018-19 bushfire season**; member discussion on the impact of fires on emergency services personnel and the general community.
- **Member appointment**; Mr Mark Bryce was re-appointed as the nominated Parks and Wildlife Service representative on the SFMC for another 3-year term.
- Fire Protection Plans; were distributed to Council members for out of session approval.
- **Red Hot Tips**; future funding proposal for Red Hot Tips for 2019-20 budget and proposed review of Planned Burning for Farmers and Landholders booklet.
- Fire Service Act Review; noted appointment of new Chair, Mr Michael Blake.
- **Fire Permit System Review**; discussion on establishment of TFS project to support the implementation of review findings.

# **Update: Bushfire Protection Plan Project**

Project aim: to provide a consistent framework, tools, education and support for FMACs to undertake bushfire risk assessments and develop fire protection plans (FPPs).

The project is still very much alive and with the same aims, however, interruption from the long and busy bushfire season as well as leave taken by the Project Officer have delayed the schedule by several months.

The Risk Training days and FMAC Risk Workshops were to be held in June, July and August this year. The Risk Training will now be held in October 2019, while the Risk Workshops will be conducted in November 2019. This delay is not ideal, but we want to be certain that the framework and guidelines for the risk assessments and FPPS are well prepared and approved by SFMC prior to running the workshops for FMACs.

A central aim of the project is to ensure that we conduct risk assessments for bushfire that are modelled on the Tasmanian Emergency Risk Assessment Guidelines (TERAG); a state-wide approach developed by Tasmania SES for all kinds of emergencies (e.g. flood, storm, bushfire). We can then consider all kinds of community values that may be impacted by bushfire, including built assets, production forests, biodiversity and community services; applying standard scales that already exist in TERAG for rating values and risk.

One of the challenges for the project is to ensure that the mapping scale of the risk assessment is appropriate – practical for FMACs to manage, with not too much unwieldy detail, but still meaningful for prioritising where investment in risk treatment is required. The preparation of data in GIS is part of this project development, using the state-wide data sets that already exist for many values as far as possible. This needs to be ready prior to the Risk Workshops to ensure that the time of the FMAC members is used efficiently.

The Project Working Group meetings have already laid much of the groundwork for the project and more meetings will be held over the coming weeks.

On 8 May a Risk Workshop was held with representatives of forest industries from across Tasmania to develop a common approach for bushfire risk assessment of production forests. State level risk workshops are efficient for organisations who operate across multiple FMACs — their contributions will be added to the risk registers and treatment plans of individual FMACs.

Following the Risk Workshops, new FPPs will be prepared. The regional FMAC Forums held in September 2018, along with the project working group, have guided the proposed new look for these plans. As a result the FPPs have been renamed as Bushfire Risk Management Plans (BRMPs). The plans will be slimmer, with a separate document providing explanatory information to avoid repetition of standard content in BRMPs. It is hoped that new BRMPs will be ready for SFMC to approve by the end of February 2020.

# Here are key dates and milestones for the revised timeline of the project:

- 31 August 2019 Framework, guidelines and risk assessment tools drafted, reviewed and final versions approved by SFMC
- 31 October 2019 training days held on the risk assessment methodology for all FMAC members to attend (there will be a choice of dates and venues in all regions)
- 30 November 2019 individual risk workshops held for all FMACs
- **31 December 2019** FMAC risk registers and treatment plans updated and finalised
- 28 February 2020 Bushfire Risk Management Plans for all FMACs submitted to SFMC for approval

The <u>Fire Centre Research Hub</u> was founded at the University of Tasmania in late 2018. The Pyrogeography Lab at UTAS hosted a number of workshops to gauge interest in a fire research centre, which some of our SFMC and FMAC members attended.

It became apparent that there was a strong appetite among practitioners for a centralised, trans-disciplinary research hub in Tasmania that could support all the research needs of the Tasmanian community.

The Fire Centre Research Hub was founded based on that need, as a virtual centre to bring together researchers from around Tasmania and be a contact point for the research needs of fire practitioners both in Tasmania and around the world.
